From the Principal:

One of the biggest buzzwords in education today is "Grit." Although the definition of this word is commonly known, in education it refers specifically to the perseverance and passion for long-term goals. Emerging research is illustrating that grit is a better indicator of success in college than measures that we typically think of, including ACT scores or GPA. In other words, not all students with a 28 on the ACT will perform equally well in college. The determining factor? Grit.

It is easy to reinforce grit in young kids because their emotions are so raw. My 3-year-old loves the challenge of a puzzle, but can be easily frustrated when the pieces don't match up. My 5-year-old is still trying to conquer his two-wheeled bike--it hasn't been the most pleasant experience for him or his parents. In both of these cases, my wife and I urge our boys to "keep trying," and we show them how much they've improved already.

At the high school level, grit is more difficult to reinforce, but it is just as important. You may have heard your student say something like, "Math is not my thing," or "I'm a horrible artist." Disguised behind comments like these is the idea that we only have a fixed amount of ability for certain things. This just isn't true! While it may be true that no amount of practice and effort will automatically turn our kids into the next Yo-Yo Ma or Michael Jordan, this same practice and effort will make them better at that skill.

When we can shift our student's thinking to approach new or difficult learning as a welcome challenge, they are more willing--and motivated--to meet these challenges directly. When your student says, "This is too hard," encourage her/him instead to say, "This may take some time and effort." When your student says, "I made a mistake," let her/him know that mistakes help them improve. After all, it is improvement, not perfection, that we're after.

On-Line Parent Portal

The Infinite Campus Portal allows parents access to their child's attendance, schedule, report cards, mid-terms, grades as posted by teachers, as well as demographic information for the current school year. The program allows for communication between the parent, counselor, and teachers regarding student process.

Freshman parents should have received an activation code last spring which would allow each parent/guardian to create their own username and password. If you have not received this code, or are having difficulty accessing the Parent Portal, please visit the login page at https://campus.d211.org/campus/portal/township.jsp and click on the link "Help" button to request assistance. Tech services can assist with resetting your password.

Students have access to their grades as posted by their teachers through the Infinite Campus Portal. Please note that not all teachers post grades on a daily basis. Students and parents do not share a common username and password with their parents. Students have the ability to activate their own account. Each student has been assigned a user name and password for their account. A student's user name is a nine digit number: three zeros followed by the student's school ID number. A student's password is the first initial of their first name, the first initial of their last name, and their birthday using the MMDDYY format. Students can activate their account by visiting the Portal Access page at

https://campus.d211.org/campus/portal/township.jsp and entering the information above. Have you downloaded the Infinite Campus App? You will need the district code to login the first time. The district code is WRPFZV.

PSAE Practice Test

As part of Fremd's comprehensive plan to prepare students for the state ACT on March 3, 2015, all juniors will participate in a practice ACT exam on October 22 from 7:30-11:50 a.m. (early dismissal for all students). Students and teachers will receive test scores in November, allowing adequate time for review before the official March test. This practice test is free to all juniors.

Check Out Colleges On October 22

To get direct and personal information about colleges, an excellent opportunity exists each October when District 211 sponsors more than 200 representatives from colleges and universities across the United States in our College Night Program. This year, college representatives will be available at Palatine High School, October 22 from 6:30 p.m. until 8:30 p.m.

The majority of schools will be located in the school gymnasium and cafeteria. Illinois state universities and a few other selected schools will be in classrooms and larger group facilities to make 30-minute presentations beginning at 6:40 p.m., 7:20 p.m., and 8:00 p.m. Other sessions include NCAA eligibility and requirements and a presentation on highly selective colleges.

With nearly 4,000 parents and students expected to attend, we encourage people to carpool or walk if you are close enough. Students and parents from the other District high schools are encouraged to ride on shuttle buses leaving Fremd High School at 6:00 p.m.

Please check the District 211 website in early October to view a list of colleges that will be attending.

Applying to Colleges

With the number of qualified applicants to college increasing annually, families must take care to complete applications in a timely manner. Seniors should schedule conferences with their counselor early in the fall. Counselors visited English classes on September 3rd to be certain that every student is aware of the proper procedures. Some general reminders follow.

Each student should submit applications to a variety of schools. This is necessary for two reasons: first, there are no guarantees on college acceptance and multiple applications help provide insurance against disappointments; second, a college choice made early in the fall may not seem as good in the spring. Alternatives need to be available for late changes in circumstances.

Most college applications require that the school <u>sends</u> a transcript. This year students are able to send transcripts electronically through Parchment. Information was sent to all senior parents and students. Parchment registration and use will be discussed on September 3rd during senior presentations. Parent authorization is required for all transcript requests. Plan to apply well in advance of any deadline. **We cannot fax transcripts.** Students should see their counselor whenever a college application is submitted electronically.

Most applications are submitted electronically. Visit the admissions page of the university to begin an on-line application. We have a tremendous wealth of college information on our website: www.fhs.d211.org. Click on College/Career. Please call your counselor for additional help. Our counseling staff is experienced and ready to assist you.

Apply early. Except for admissions at selective schools, most applications should be submitted prior to **November 1**. Often this November 1 deadline applies to any university scholarships.
